Replacing the pipes has not solved the problem completely, even though water is still accumulated in the front portion, towards the main entrance of the alley, is no less a cause for worry

"The problem exists in many ways, even though it's not as bad as before," said Suresh Gupta, who works in a nearby restaurant. HISTORY:

The Human Library is an international organization and movement that first started in Copenhagen, Denmark in 2000. It aims to address people's prejudices by helping them to talk to those they would not normally meet. The organisation uses a library analogy of lending people rather than books.

INDIAN CONTEXT:

- The first Human Library in India that was set up in Indore.
- Around India it is a event-based programme.
- who have experienced prejudice or been victimised due to race, sex, age, disability, sexual preference, gender identity, class, religion/belief, lifestyle choices or other aspects of who they are.

LOCATION:

To be held monthly in Govt. Model Senior Secondary School Sector 35 D, where different rooms are allocated at different times for group as well as personal sessions.

HOW TO CONNECT:

Designated Members from the Welfare Associations Social Media Platforms and Door to Door Information spreading.

BENEFITS:

- Human libraries are designed to overcome differences within a community and bring people together.
- Instill a positive change in the readers.
- Overcome social distances and make connections with community members.
- Interactional knowledge sharing platforms
- Personal enjoyment and fun as a benefit.





OBJECTIVE:

- Human Library is a library of people, it replaces books with human beings.
- Aims to challenge prejudice against social contact among people.
- People who visit, borrow these living books, have a conversation with them and leave with a widened perspective on different social groups in our society.

EXAMPLE:

Of the many topics covered by the Human Library in Hyderabad, is one on Surviving Domestic Violence. It is about Saroja who has been a victim of domestic violence for over 12 years. She took a bold step and approached an NGO and from thereon could gather courage to say No to abuse, Subsequently she got out of the abusive relationship and is now managing her life and taking care of her 2 daughters all by herself. Her Struggles, Experiences and real life events were told by her which could enable and open doors suffering in the same situation.

WHO CAN ATTEND:

- People from all age groups.
- Should be open to all

WHO CAN BE A BOOK:

- Senior Citizens from Old age homes who have their history of experiences and learning inculcated over the years. They can impart values, teachings and knowledge to the younger generation.
- Residential Old Age Citizens.
- Victim of prejudice
- Who has a story to tell to make a difference to readers.

CONCLUSION:

- Human libraries provide readers with access to the knowledge and personal experiences of their fellow community members.
